

What's the NOFO?

- It used to be called a NOFA
- Announces the process by which HUD will make annual funding available to homeless service agencies across the country
- Only "Lead Agencies" can complete the "submission" to HUD
- Lead Agencies must also conduct a local application process
- Local applications are for agency projects, not for individuals seeking assistance

HUD NOFO Published

• The final submission is due to HUD on 11/16

 The local competition applications must be completed no later than 10/16. HSN is working on final timeline to confirm the actual due date

- Local competition includes opportunities for
 - Renewals
 - New Projects
 - Bonus
 - Reallocation



Renewals

Renewals

- Important: If your agencies is a sub-recipient of a HUD Bundle, your competition will occur in the spring. This includes agencies that receive funding as part of

 - HUD Operations and Services
 - HUD Rental Assistance and Services
 - HUD Leasing
 - HUD Coordinated Entry



Renewals

Bonus

- one or more new projects
- Can request (but won't receive) over \$400K
- DV Bonus can request (but won't receive) over \$1M

Reallocation

- Apply to compete against an existing project
- A specific project open for full or partial reallocation may be identified in the local application Request for Applications (RFA)



FEDERAL EDUCATION DEFINITION OF HOMELESSNESS

Individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence.



Shelters/Transitional Housing

Domestic violence shelters, homeless shelters, youth shelters, trailers provided by FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency), housing paid for by programs such as transitional housing, etc.



Hotels/Motels

Staying in motels/hotels due to lack of adequate alternatives, regardless of who pays for the motel/hotel room.



Staying with others

Staying with other people due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason.



Unsheltered

Staying in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings.

Homeless Living Situations

Shared Housing Due to Hardship:

Lease but not everyone in the house is listed on the lease (lack of regularity)


Any situation where the family can be evicted at any minute (lack of regularity)

10 people living in a 2 bedroom home (lack of adequateness)

Living in a home infested with bugs or mold (lack of adequateness)

- Hotels/Motels, Shelters Due to Hardship (lack of regularity and adequateness)
- Streets and Cars Due to Hardship (not fixed, adequate, or regular)
- Substandard Housing no utilities, mold, infestation (lack of adequateness)
- Rapid Rehousing Some families may qualify if the funding is temporary. (lack of Regularity)

COLLEGE

- First semester of college generally free (for all MVP students) with letter from MVP district liaison.
 - Florida §1009.25 (1991) A student who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, or who lives in a shelter or a public or private place not ordinarily used as regular accommodation, is exempt from the payment of tuition and fees for a school district workforce education program, Florida College System institution, or state university.
- Application fee is waived.

Orange Technical College

 Free tuition, books, fees for MVP graduates up to age 21 and parents of MVP students.



Additional MVP Supports

• Kids' Closet:

- Clothing, hygiene items, food, etc.
- Requests submitted by our team or school social worker.



- Field Trip fees: (up to \$25 per student) on a first come, first serve basis
- Activity fees: (up to \$75)
 on a first come, first
 serve basis, course
 related
- Cap and Gown Fees

Additional MVP Supports

Transportation

- Gas Card or Lynx bus passes while bus is being routed.
- Lynx bus passes for high school students attending after school activities and/or for parents and students to attend conferences or night time school activities.



Hotel Housing Assistance:

- MUST be living in a hotel showing regular past payments.
- Must have a welcome letter and a W-9 from a landlord and/or apartment complex.
- Must have an income source that covers rent with an additional amount of reasonable income.

Unaccompanied Homeless Youth (UHY)

Includes:

- Homeless students not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian.
- Meet the definition for homelessness under McKinney-Vento OR parent they are not in custody of meet MVP definition.



UHY SUPPORTS

- FAFSA Assistance: Ability to submit for financial aid WITHOUT parent information and income. Letter provided by MVP district liaison.
- After 2023 do not have to re-identify each year.
- Florida does not have specific laws that allow UHY ability to enter into shelter under the age of 18 without a parent/legal guardian.

WHO QUALIFIES?





Families living in transitional shelters, tents, streets, or hotels, (including those with a lease in hotels turned apartments) due to financial hardship.











Families sharing housing due to financial hardship. This may include families with a lease if not all those living at the residence are on the lease.



Families living in inadequate housing situations. This includes multiple kids sleeping in one bed, on the floor, or couch. Mold or bug infestation and locations not intended for long term housing (garage without a bathroom or kitchen, or a shed)


Families and students who move or "migrate" frequently due to work based on the needs of harvest of the farms.

On the East Coast, many migrant workers start their work year in Florida, pass through to North Carolina in the spring, and then head to Michigan in late summer and fall. Then they repeat the circuit the next year.


- The McKinney Vento Act states "children and youth who lack a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence" are considered homeless.
 - Temporarily with friend/family due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason
 - In an emergency/ transitional shelter
 - In a vehicle/camper/tent/abandoned building
 - In a hotel/motel due to the loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason
- Any student that is eligible and/or receiving free or reduced lunch would be identified as Economically Disadvantaged.





Identification of Homeless Status









Bites Camera Action & Connection to HSN

- December 2012, Universal /SHFB rolled out the BCA Resource Fairs at the Schools
- BCA supported Homeless living in hotels in Orange, Osceola and Seminole
- April 2018, BCA program changed to Homeless receiving Case Management (only)
- May 23, 2018, **Connected with HSN**. Denise met at HSN Site and conducted Training with Allison Nye and Louise Carlos for the BCA family food box program.
- Community Outreach BCA Program currently serves 97 Sites monthly
- Community Health & Wellness Resource Fairs at Schools/ Drive Through Boxes Dropped....Previous 6 sites/ Memorial Middles School and Eccleston Elementary
- Client Feedback Circle Through Listen for Good (L4G): Completed three (3) surveys from March 2019 until July 2021. Includes Eccleston Elementary, Orlando Neighborhood Improvement Corporation (ONIC) and Veteran Affairs (recent sample attached).

What is Second Harvest Food Bank?

Second Harvest Food Bank of Central Florida is a private, nonprofit organization that collects, stores and distributes donated food to more than <u>550 feeding partners</u> in six Central Florida counties: Brevard, Lake, Orange, Osceola, Seminole and Volusia.

Last year, the food bank distributed enough food for 96 million meals to partner programs such as food pantries, soup kitchens, women's shelters, senior centers, day care centers and Kids Cafes.

Quick overview of other resources?

In addition to helping feed the line of our <u>neighbors who need help</u>, Second Harvest also transforms thousands of lives directly every year.

- Culinary Program- Economically-challenged adults who graduate from our 16-week culinary training program are placed in 'better than minimum wage' jobs that set them and their families on a path to selfsustainability.
- 2. Benefits Connection Yet another important activity helps connect people who are eligible to receive SNAP food assistance benefits with the resources they need to access the program and get help.

Eligibility Requirements:

- ✓ Minimum 18 years of age
- Authorized to work in the United States
- Have experienced financial instability (unemployment, low wage, government assistance, etc.) during the last 12
 months
- Must not possess a criminal history involving arson, sexual battery or violent crimes. All other criminal activity records will be considered on a case-by-case basis
- ✓ Must agree to disclose and provide criminal history records
- ✓ Must agree to a background check and drug test
- Must be drug and alcohol-free for at least one year prior to the application and enrolled in a rehabilitation support program
- High School Diploma or G.E.D. preferred, or the ability to meet minimum aptitude requirements based on curriculum needs
- Demonstrate an enthusiasm for and willingness to commit to the Program and food service industry
- Must have the physical ability to perform required kitchen duties as assigned, including standing for long periods of time, lifting (which may include up to 50 lbs.), bending and, on occasion, working in rooms with cool temperatures (below 40° F)
- ✓ Must be able to attend classes Monday through Friday, 8:30 am to 2:00 pm for 16 weeks.







Who we surveyed



We surveyed **VA participants** who participated in the food from the program in 2021






37% of respondents are Black/African American, 33% are Hispanic/Latino and 25% are White




Who we surveyed



73% of respondents are male



72% of respondents live alone





What we learned from the survey



Learned more about our program participants

Participants report feeling less stressed, and having more confidence in being able to meet basic needs as a result of the program.

Overall, participants are very satisfied with what we do

Most participants describe the program as meeting their needs either fairly, very or extremely well.

Participants would like to see more variety and quantity of food in the boxes

Participants would like to see more of a variety overall, more meat, and diabetic-friendly items.



Our NPS score



Overall, participants rated the monthly food box program positively and said they were likely to recommend it to others

VA Food Box NPS Score



Respondents to the question "How Likely are you to recommend..." are grouped into 3 categories:

- Promoters (rate 9-10)
- Passives (rate 7-8)
- Detractors (rate 0-6)

The percentage of Promoters minus the percentage of Detractors becomes your Net Promoter Score, which can range from -100 to 100.

Similar Grantees NPS Score









60% of participants surveyed said we've met their needs "extremely well" or "very well"








Client experience: by location

How well has the monthly food box program met your needs?




What do you like about the monthly food box program?


What could the monthly food box program do better?




What 3 foods do you most like to receive in the food boxes?









What other foods would you like to see in the monthly box?

Since the survey...

- Due to generous community/funder support & temporary additional funding, we are able to serve 3x the number of veterans each month.
- Box contents have been revised to reflect survey feedback
- Boxes contents will continue to be rotated periodically to offer more variety



Next Steps

 What is the best way to communicate some of these results/program changes with the Veterans?

The survey results/program changes information can be passed on to the VA peer support specialists and VA social workers; and they will pass along the results as they meet with each of the veterans, as they are scheduled on their caseload.

Which info would you like to share/address?

Since the survey, food items that veterans most wanted to see in the food boxes such as milk, meat, fruit, cereal, snacks, diabetic friendly contents will be provided in the immediate future. Also, the contents of the food boxes will continue to be rotated periodically to offer more variety.
